## **Seth Kirshenberg**

For over 25 years, Mr. Kirshenberg has been the Executive Director of the Energy Communities Alliance (ECA), the national non-profit organization of elected local government officials adjacent to nuclear facilities in the United States. He oversees the daily activities of the organization and ensures that DOE, industry and others understand and address local community issues and integrate them into policy decision-making.

He has published several books and articles and regularly speaks on renewable and advanced reactor energy development, environmental cleanup, spent nuclear fuel, public private partnerships, public participation, brownfields, and reuse of federal facilities and he regularly speaks at conferences and meetings. He has participated on several national federal advisory committees and boards on International Atomic Energy Agency, US EPA and US DOE issues and has participated on several national initiatives including those led by the Aspen Institute, Keystone Institute and others around the areas of the environment, public private partnerships, nuclear waste, spent nuclear fuel, nuclear energy production, and national defense.

He is also an attorney at Kutak Rock LLP where he has worked on over \$25 billion dollars of structured finance transactions in the US and abroad including those located on DOE and other federal government facilities, international nuclear fuel storage facilities and a small modular reactor.

Mr. Kirshenberg holds a Juris Doctorate degree from the Washington College of Law at the American University and a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from the University of Florida. He has been a Vice Chair of the Privatization, Outsourcing and Financing Transactions Committee for the American Bar Association and is an Executive Board Member of the Council of Development Finance Agencies.

#### **Padraic Benson**



## **Niki Stephanie Nicholas**

Niki Stephanie Nicholas is the Superintendent of both the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area and the Obed Wild and Scenic River and is the Site Manager of the Manhattan Project National Historical Park. Prior to taking her current National Park Service assignment she served as Chief of Resources Management and Science at Yosemite National Park for seven years. Before that Nicholas was Senior Manager for Environmental Impact Reduction Technologies with the Tennessee Valley

Colleen has developed partnerships that enhance the park at Hanford, including working with area tribal nations, local community and state leaders, members of Congress and their staffs, and the Washington State Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation. She is the Hanford Site representative to the DOE-

NPS Joint Park Management Team, which has policy decision-making responsibility for the three-site park and works with other senior leaders at DOE and NPS to develop and manage one of the nation's most complex national parks.

As the facility manager of the B Reactor National Historic Landmark starting in 2009, Colleen has driven and overseen transition of the facility from nearing demolition as part of Hanford cleanup to welcoming more than 10,000 visitors each year via public tours and special events. She has been a fierce advocate for providing broad public access to Hanford's historic facilities and worked across the DOE organization to eliminate age and citizenship requirements for national park visitors in 2015. This work was honored with the Chairman's Award from the President's Advisory Council on Historic Preservation in 2011, and community "Tourism Champion of the Year" awards in 2008 and 2015. She was also awarded the Preservation Excellence award from the Washington State Historic Preservation Office in 2018 for the rehabilitation of the historic White Bluffs Bank.

Earlier in her career, she served as the Director of DOE Richland's Office of Communications and External Affairs, where she led a diverse set of external and intergovernmental programs including media relations, tribal affairs, cultural resource protection, local and state government relations, congressional affairs, site tour programs, and public involvement.
